St. Louis Children's Hospital transport team

Since May 2013, St. Louis Children's Hospital has housed a transport team at Parkland Health Center.


The transport team includes:

- two registered nurses with extensive training in newborn and pediatric intensive care and pediatric trauma
- pediatric-certified paramedic
- KidsFlight helicopter and specially trained pilot
- pediatric mobile intensive care unit (MICU)

The transport team can:

- respond within minutes
- serve rural hospital emergency departments within a 250-mile radius
- transport a patient to St. Louis Children's Hospital in record time
- assist the Parkland Health Center staff with the medical care of a baby or child when not on a call

The transport team has been warmly welcomed in the Parkland community. The Parkland Health Center Foundation provided the funding needed to complete the living quarters for the crew, a new helipad and a canopy for the MICU.

Parkland Health Center hosts press conference for Governor Nixon

Parkland Health Center hosted a press conference for Missouri Governor Jeremiah (Jay) Nixon in April. The governor held similar events at community hospitals across the state to announce his position on Medicaid Expansion. On Friday, April 11, 2014, Governor Nixon addressed the media and a crowded lobby at Parkland Health Center in Farmington.

Prior to the press conference, Governor Nixon met with hospital administrators

from Parkland Health Center and Mineral Area Regional Medical Center as well as a handful of representatives from other health care organizations. The lobby of Parkland Health Center was packed when Governor Nixon took the podium to address the media. He addressed the issue in a brief presentation, and then took questions from the audience.



Huckstep Heart and Lung Center celebrates 20th anniversary

Robert A. Huckstop, MD, was once described by another prominent community leader as a “Man for all Seasons,” a reference to Robert Bolt’s play about Sir Thomas More. Like More, Dr. Huckstep was a man of principle who was loved by everyday people and by his family.



Dr. Huckstep was a well-respected physician in the Parkland area for nearly thirty years. He was a man of faith. He was a family man, and along with his wife Mary, he raised two sons and a daughter. He loved and served his community, including many years in service as a school board member in Farmington and later as a trustee at Mineral Area College. Dr. Huckstep was a gentleman; his kind demeanor was always present.

According to Dr. Huckstep’s daughter, Sue Jones, her father was always thinking of other people. Jones, a registered nurse, is a case coordinator in the social services department at Parkland Health Center. She has

worked at Parkland for 24 years. Sue explained, “As heart disease and the accompanying decrease in quality of life moved to the forefront in our culture, my father wanted to help. In the early 1990s, he envisioned a center in which heart patients could receive assistance in returning to a normal and active life, therefore improving their quality of life.”

Dr. Huckstep later succumbed to heart disease himself and passed away in late 1992, but his vision became reality when Parkland Health Center’s

cardiac rehabilitation center was opened in 1994 – in memory of Dr. Huckstep. Later the vision was expanded to include respiratory rehabilitation services. The Huckstep Heart and Lung Center now provides cardiac and pulmonary rehabilitation services to approximately 250 patients annually.

Huckstep Heart and Lung Center is an out-patient program at Parkland Health Center in Farmington that is designed for patients with heart and/or lung disease to help them return to an active, healthy lifestyle following discharge from the hospital. Additionally, the programs seek to help individuals manage their heart or lung disease so that the heart patient will have less risk of further heart trouble, and the lung patient will experience less shortness of breath and other symptoms, and in turn, will experience a better quality of life.

On May 2, Parkland Health Center and the community celebrated the 20th anniversary of Huckstep Heart and Lung Center. Honored guests who were present to help recognize this milestone included Sue Jones and Erica Bertram, Dr. Huckstep’s daughter and granddaughter. The legacy of our own “Man for all Seasons” carries on.



“Kick the Stigma” starts local and then goes global

Gabriel Crawford, RN, MSN, manager of Parkland Health Center’s geriatric psychiatry department had a little idea. He had no idea that this little idea would soon catch on as far away as Taiwan.

Crawford has a passion for mental health and the people who deal with mental illness. He began thinking of some simple ways that Parkland Health Center could show support for, and raise awareness of, mental illness. It started out with an idea and he began developing it with Karen Miller and Michelle Ramirez of BJC Behavioral Health. The idea evolved into green t-shirts and finally green socks. The idea received a “green light.” The date was set for May 16, and the “Kick the

Stigma” campaign began. Crawford says the “kick” part of the campaign evolved out of the sock idea.

Crawford said the goal of this effort was to provide awareness of mental illness. “Awareness is the key to fighting the stigma of mental illness. Providing education where fear of the unknown resides will help in the fight to kick the stigma,” Crawford added.

Between BJC Behavioral Health in Farmington, the Friends in Action Clubhouse in Park Hills and their contacts in the mental health field in the area, the “Kick the Stigma” message got out quickly. Lime green “Kick the Stigma” t-shirts and lime green socks were ordered and the group made

these available to be purchased and worn in organizations all over St. Francois County.

Through their membership in Clubhouse International, the Friends in Action Clubhouse was able to get in touch with accredited clubhouses in more than 30 countries. They heard back from clubhouses in Missouri, California, Taiwan and Argentina, which launched the “Kick the Stigma” campaign globally!

“It was amazing how people and other organizations came together to be a part of this campaign,” Crawford said. “It was so much more than we ever hoped. We can’t wait to do it again next year.”

Revolutionary War captain buried on Parkland Health Center grounds

If you take a walk around the grounds of Parkland Health Center in Farmington, you'll find beautiful trees, carefully manicured lawns, flowers and all the things you might expect to see on a typical hospital campus. But if your walk takes you off road, back behind the parking lots and helipad, you'll find something unusual, that you might not even notice at first. It is small and tucked between trees. If you look carefully, you'll find a small family cemetery that holds the remains of Captain William Alexander and several of his family members.

Each Memorial Day at this small family cemetery on the campus of Parkland Health Center, employees gather along with local veterans' organizations to honor Captain Alexander, a Revolutionary War soldier, farmer and family man. This year, the formal ceremony included members of the VFW Post 5896, the American Legion Post 416 and the local junior ROTC. Captain Alexander's final resting place was decorated with the flag that he fought for. Fellow veterans celebrated his life and service in the historic war that took place more than 200 years ago, with full military honors, including a 21-gun salute and the mournful playing of Taps.

Captain Alexander served in the 4th North Carolina Regiment which was authorized and organized in 1776 at Wilmington, North Carolina for service with the Continental Army. The regiment was originally under the command of Colonel Thomas Polk, Lieutenant Colonel James Thackston and Major William Lee Davidson. The regiment was in many battles, including the Battles of Brandywine, Germantown, Monmouth, and the Siege of



Charleston. They were captured by the British Army in 1780 in Charleston, South Carolina and disbanded in 1783, the year that the war ended.

Captain Alexander was married to Elizabeth Fish, and while still in North Carolina, they had two sons. Captain Alexander was a farmer and believed that the new Missouri country offered opportunity for his family, so in 1817 he moved his family to Jefferson County, Missouri. In 1821 they moved to St. Francois County where he worked a 700 acre farm. The couple went on to have one more son and five daughters.

Captain Alexander died between 1835 and 1840 in St. Francois County and is buried on what is now the campus of Parkland Health Center on Liberty Street in Farmington, Missouri.

Historical records show that Captain Alexander, along with Henry Poston, John Andrews and James Holbert, met in the home of Jesse Murphy in St. Francois County in 1822, and was appointed to be a commissioner for the purpose of locating a perma-

nent county seat. That county seat became Farmington, named after its rich farmland.

Among those elected early on to represent St. Francois County in the Missouri House of Representatives was Corbin Alexander, son of Captain and Mrs. Alexander. Corbin Alexander served in The House of Representatives from 1830 to 1836, and then again from 1854 to 1856. Prior to this, Corbin was elected sheriff of St. Francois County, serving in that capacity from 1827 to 1828. He also served as Deputy Clerk in the circuit court. His passion for public service lived on, as his son John Corbin Alexander, Captain Alexander's grandson, also served for many years as circuit clerk and recorder of St. Francois County.

His passion for service to his country lives on as Parkland Health Center employees, fellow veterans and young people gather together on the campus of Parkland Health Center each year and remember this man, unknown to

"We were pleased to honor the hospital with this much-deserved award."

Diabetic and Wound Care Centers Move to New Location

On March 6, 2014, Dr. Brian Gallagher officially cut the ribbon on the new location for Parkland Health Center’s Wound and Diabetic Care Centers. The ribbon cutting celebration, which included the Farmington Regional Chamber of Commerce, as well as the Park Hills-Leadington Chamber of Commerce, brought more than 150 members of the community to the hospital to see the new facility and learn how it will benefit patients.

“The new location offers parking just a few steps from the door, allowing easier access to patients with mobility issues,” says Dr. Gallagher, Medical Director for the Wound Care Center. “The extra space has allowed for a more comfortable visit for our patients as well.”

Tours of the new facility, including the hyperbaric oxygen therapy chamber, were conducted throughout the celebration. The new facility includes a comfortable waiting area, a classroom for support group meetings and classes and several exam and treatment rooms.

The new facility is located at Parkland Health Center on Liberty Street in Farmington, behind the emergency department. Parking is reserved specifically for wound and diabetic care center patients, and is just outside the clinic door. Patients and staff are very pleased with the new, spacious and convenient location.


Parkland Cancer Center: New Name, Same Excellent Care

While it has provided care for over 25 years, the Parkland Health Center Oncology/Hematology Center has a new name. In 2014, the center officially became the Parkland Cancer Center.

Located close to home at Parkland Health Center-Bonne Terre, the Parkland Cancer Center is dedicated solely to the treatment of cancer and blood disorders. The center provides primary cancer treatment, continuous follow-up, consultations and second opinions for cancer and blood disorder management for patients who are 17 years and older.

The center's treatment team includes four physicians from Missouri Baptist Medical Center in St. Louis board certified in Hematology/Oncology and Internal Medicine, oncology-certified nurses, a pharmacist, chaplain, social worker, auxiliary volunteers and other support staff. The Cancer Center offers the same clinical expertise and advanced technology that you would find at a large medical center, but all offered at a convenient location near home.

The Parkland Cancer Center team includes four physicians board certified in Internal Medicine and Hematology/Oncology. In addition to seeing patients at Parkland Cancer Center, our physicians are also partners of Midwest Hematology/Oncology Consultants, Inc. and associated with the Cancer Center at Missouri Baptist Medical Center in St. Louis. School Outreach Program

In Parkland Health Center's 2013 Community Health Needs Assessment, prevention education surfaced as a need for our community. In response to this need, Parkland Health Center and Parkland Health Center Foundation are collaborating with BJC School Outreach and Youth Development in implementing a very generous grant from the Foundation. Named the School Outreach Program, Parkland is offering prevention education to youth in grades 2-12 in all five public school districts as well as both parochial schools in St. Francois County. The Parkland Health Center Foundation is sponsoring the project over the course of three years beginning with the 2014-2015 school year.

BJC School Outreach and Youth Development provides prevention education for K-12th grade youth in the six areas of health identified by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The six program areas include nutrition, physical activity, substance abuse, tobacco cessation, sexual behaviors and safety. In the first step of the program, meetings with school representatives were held to determine each school's greatest



needs, and also to avoid duplicating services. Planning took place during the summer, and the teaching began during the fall 2014 semester.



Laura James, (left), health educator with the School Outreach Program, says that as early as November, the program was already making an impact. In

a quarterly report regarding the Bismarck School District, for example, James says that pre- and post-tests show a significant improvement in knowledge following the teachings. In addition, students and teachers rated their overall satisfaction with the course as 4.71 and with the instructor as five on a five-point scale, while teachers rated both as a five. Ninety-seven percent of students felt this program should be offered at their school for other students, and 100 percent of teachers would recommend this program to other teachers.

Participating schools during 2014 included Bismarck Elementary School, West County Elementary School, West County Middle School, St. Joseph Catholic School and North County Intermediate School.

In addition to education for students, the Parkland Health Center Foundation has offered to fund the continuing education training for all school nurses in St. Francois County for a three-year period. In 2014, twelve area school nurses responded and the Foundation sponsored their attendance at the two-day BJC School Outreach and Youth Development School Nurse Survival Conference.



Here is what Bismarck students and teachers said about the School Outreach Program:

They teach us about forgiving and building courage in others.

I really hope they do this with other students.

I liked how the teachers helped our class get along better.

What I like most about the Buddies program is that they teach us we do have the power to stop bullying.

I have had more students willing to "own" their own behavior and willing to make it right.

After the safety program, I think of what I am going to say before I say it because I could hurt somebody's feelings when I am not trying to hurt their feelings at all.



Auxiliary Contributes to Foundation

Parkland Health Center has two auxiliaries, one at Parkland-Bonne Terre and one at Parkland-Farmington. The auxiliaries not only assist Parkland by contributing funds for projects that help with the care of patients, but they also give the opportunity for volunteers from the community to offer their time to help make the patient experience more personal.

At the Farmington location, auxiliary volunteers operate the hospital's beautiful gift shop, staff the customer service desk in the main hospital lobby, escort patients to their medical procedures, serve as patient advocates, deliver flowers and mail to patients, assist with special events and projects, and volunteer in various clerical roles. In addition, since 1979 auxiliary volunteers have been delivering meals to homebound patients on weekdays through Parkland's Meals-on-Wheels for Special Diets program.

At Parkland's Bonne Terre location, auxiliary volunteers operate the gift shop, staff the customer service desk, and assist in many ways to help make the experience in our Cancer Center more comfortable for our patients while they are receiving their treatment.

Auxiliary Contributions

Volunteer time: Recent records show that on an annual basis, approximately 85 auxiliary volunteers have contributed a total of about 10,500 hours annually!

Equipment: In addition to helping patients, working in the gift shop and delivering meals, the auxiliary has contributed many needed items to the hospital. In fact, since the auxiliary was founded, contributions to the hospital to help patients total in the hundreds of thousands of dollars!

Examples of items contributed over the years include:

- Two patient shuttles, including the current 13 passenger bus that transports patients to and from the parking lot;
- Medical equipment, including x-ray, emergency equipment, EKG, Doppler, and incubator.
- Meals on Wheels for Special Diets.
- 2014 contributions to the Parkland Health Center Foundation for future use:
\$2,550 – Bonne Terre Auxiliary
\$15,000 – Farmington Auxiliary
